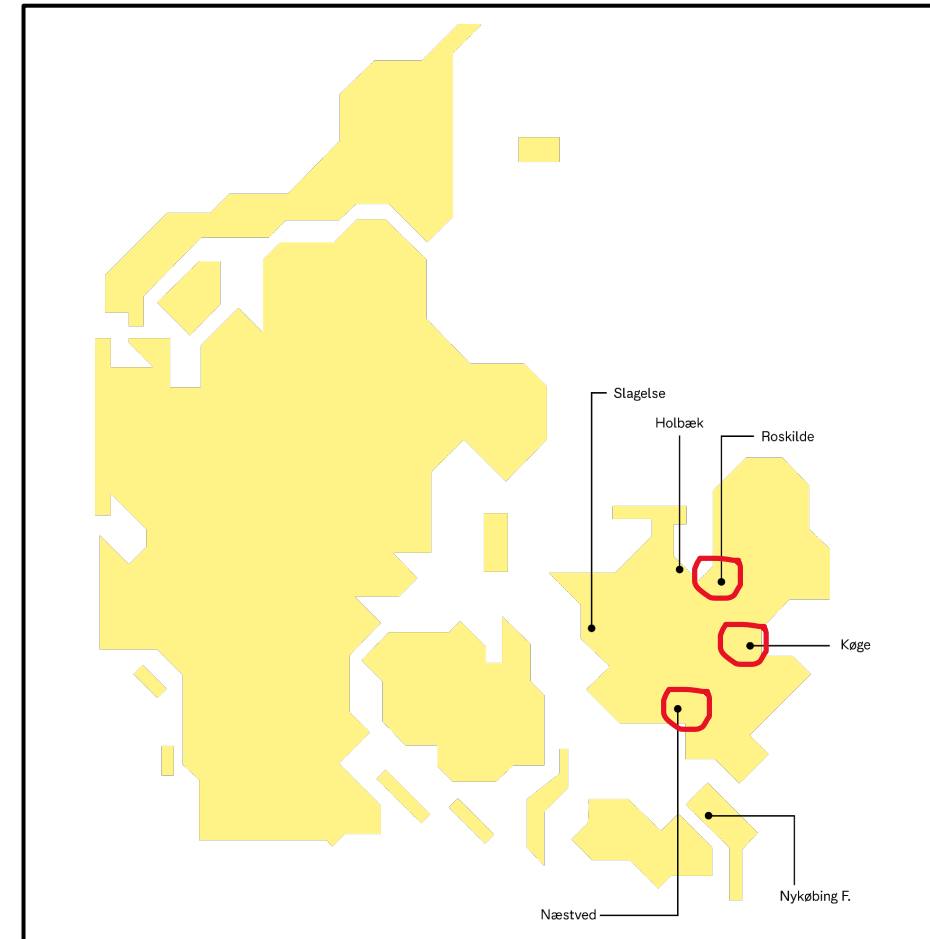

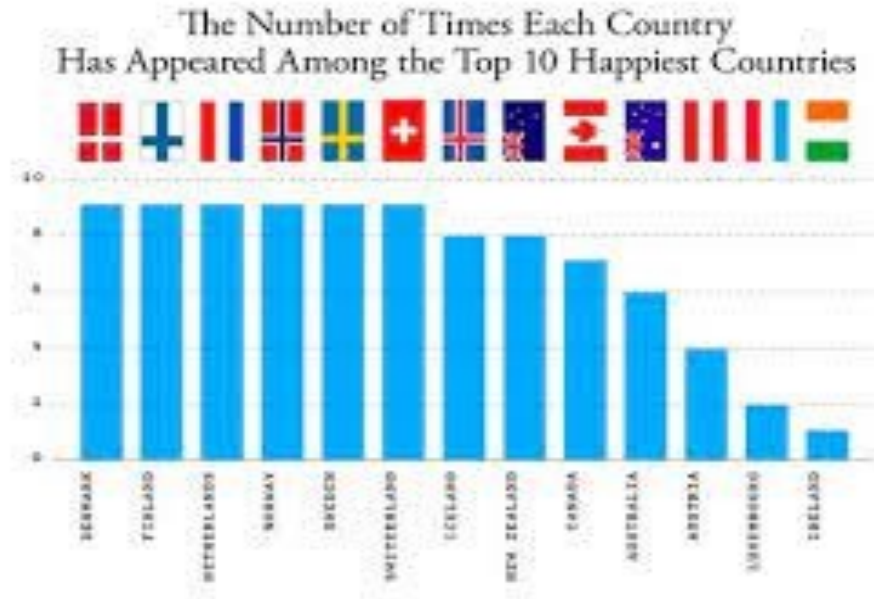
ZEALAND – WHO ARE WE...

- PUBLIC – Academy of professional Higher Education
Under the Danish Ministry of Higher Education and Science
- An Academy in a Danish context – similar to University of Applied Sciences
- 5th largest Academy in Denmark:
 - Approx. 3,500 full time students (Ordinary Higher Education programmes)
 - Approx. 2000 part time students (Adult/Continuing programmes)
 - Approx. 250 staff (Academic and Technical/Administrative)
 - 22 full-time programmes – technical, business and IT
 - 7 part-time programmes
 - **International exchange programs are only in Roskilde, Køge and Næstved**

A laid-back lifestyle

The Danish way of living is usually perceived as one the more laid-back lifestyles.

When you arrive in Denmark you might notice the relaxed atmosphere, an endless number of people on bikes and that things generally run smoothly.

Bikes, bikes, bikes...

4 mil. people - but 20 mil. bikes in Denmark

Bikes can be quite cheap, often the fastest solution (no waiting for the bus), and most Danes will bike regardless of rain or snow.

Busses, metros, and local trains are all good reliable options for transportation. Across Denmark, there are trains ferries, and coach services that you can take.

Train lines run between the different regions.

You must have a valid ticket or commuter card when using public transportation, as the fines for riding without one are high in all cities.



”TAKE RESPONSIBILITY FOR YOUR OWN EDUCATION”

- Philosophy of Danish education - it means that you are rarely tested on the reading or having your attendance checked.
- Do not take this as **a reason to skip class** or not do the reading. (exams and assignments you need to pass and many subjects might include group work with other students, who are depending on you to show up prepared).
- Being able to solve the problems on your own is a large component of the Danish exams, and imaginative and individual inputs are often rewarded, as long as they are academically sound and validly argued.
- The educational system is designed to promote creativity, innovation, analytical and critical thinking. Most of this is encountered by Danish pupils already in primary school.

WHAT TO EXPECT - FAQ



VIBRANT STUDY ENVIRONMENT

- Dedicated teachers, who are passionate about their subjects and are looking forward to transferring their knowledge to you.
- Full time study = approx. 37 hours a week (classroom lessons + project work with other students + preparation at home, individually and in study groups).
- Typical week for student: 10-14 lectures or seminars and 20-27 hours of self-studying and group work.
- Autumn semester usually starts in late **AUGUST** and ends at the end of **JANUARY**. Classes usually ends in December with examinations in January.
- Spring semester usually starts in early **FEBRUARY** and ends at the end of **JUNE**. Classes usually ends in Maj with examinations in June.
- In Denmark it is not considered as a bad manners to interrupt or to ask a professor a questions during lectures.
- As a student in Denmark, you can expect high quality education, where you will also learn from industry experts, and do internships in big companies/organizations.

You will also be studying in a safe and innovation-driven environment.

MOVING TO DENMARK

- ❑ EU/EEA – no need for visa (you apply EU residence upon arrival and we will help you with this)
- ❑ NON-EU – you need a study residence permit (we start your application upon admission)

❑ Insurance:

- EU: Bring your European Health Insurance Card (EHIC).
- When you will arrive we will do the cpr. registration and you will get your “Yellow Card/”Sundhedskort”
- NON-EU: Own insurance for first 4-6 weeks, cpr. registration in Denmark and Yellow Card/”Sundhedskort”
